A Pastor's Ponderings

This pondering is adapted from a sermon I preached at the Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of Riverside on March 24, 2018.

"No one pours new wine into old leather wineskins; otherwise, the wine would burst the wineskins and the wine would be lost and the wineskins destroyed. But new wine is for new wineskins." Mark 2:22

I have been privileged over the last year to observe and participate in the winemaking process. A good wine has complex flavors that meld together well and this wine that I got to observe and participate in the making of has about 229 distinct flavors. When this wine first touches your palate, there are hints of the Grants, Nelsons, and Gale Teunissen. As it continues onto the palate, there are flavors of the Cohens, Bowers, and Kirbys. As it gets to the rear of the pallet, the flavors of the Smiths, the Lewises, and Wrights come out. As you swish it back and forth in your mouth, you get the flavors of the Alfords, Williamses, Stifflers and Dickensons. Depending what part of the batch you got, you might even have hints of the Vegas, Bob Lewis, and Nita Fages. In case you missed it, yes, I am describing the membership of MagPres. I name a few families as representatives of the whole and if I didn't mention your family by name, I apologize.

I have seen some really great things happen in this congregation over the last year:

- -the start of a new era of ministry with Pastors Claire and Paul as Co-Pastors
- -the growth of the children's program
- -a re-created and energized 9am worship service that meets in the Fellowship Hall
- -a re-evaluation of our outreach to those who are shelter insecure and an unfinished exploration of our approach to reach the materially poor and those in poverty
- -the growth of the youth group
- -the approval and formation of Ecophillians, an educational and encouragement group focused on being good stewards of the earth (cont. page 5)

A Minister's Musings

"Don't remember prior things; don't ponder ancient history. Look! I am doing a new thing; now it sprouts up; don't you recognize it? Isaiah 43:18-19

This verse from Isaiah has the potential of bringing up all sorts of feelings; excitement, anticipation, hope, fear, sadness, and probably even anger. Whenever something new is being attempted there is risk involved and with that risk most often comes anxiety. Tod Bolsinger in his book *Canoeing the Mountains*, says that the response to that anxiety can be to either go back to what has already been done or do nothing. He states that when anxiety comes, "we have to resist the temptation to fight, flee, or freeze...deliberately resisting our default reaction to repeat what we have already done, hoping this time it will have a different result."

When it was decided that Pastor Paul and I would lead our Jr. and Sr. High youth groups while we looked for a new leader, I have to say this "new thing" caused me some anxiety; would the youth accept me, would I have anything to offer them, could I keep up with them? One of the things we do each week in youth group is go around the circle and share our "highs and lows," and what I have discovered in this time is that most often the "highs" of my week have centered on sharing in leadership of the youth and interacting with them. Youth leadership at this stage of my life was never something I even remotely anticipated and yet it has been one of my joys in the last 8 months and has sustained me through some of the more challenging times. Now we are looking forward to something new for the youth in hiring a new youth leader, Chris Stanley. I am excited for what God is going to do with and for our youth in this new relationship, even as I am a bit sad that I will not be involved as much.

Just as youth leadership was not on my radar when I felt called to ministry, neither was Co-Pastoring. Recognizing that in the past year there have been some highs and lows through this transition, working with Paul as a Co-Pastor has also been one of my joys. I give thanks for the partnership and willingness of this congregation to trust us as we try new things and new ways of being, recognizing that it has not always been comfortable for some. I look forward to more "new things" with excitement and hope, believing that our God has amazing things in store for MagPres.

Deacon's Corner

What is a deacon? A person who is a "servant" or "minister". In the New Testament, Paul describes himself and other Christians as servants or ministers. Deacon was an office in the early church ministry.

Who were the first deacons? In Acts 6:2-4, Paul talks about the Apostles gathering the disciples together to choose seven men to carry out the responsibilities of serving and caring for the widows.

What type of person is suited for the office of deacon? Acts 6:3-4 says those "who are known to be full of the Spirit and wisdom." Also, in 1 Timothy 3:8-9 "Deacons are to be men of worthy of respect, sincere, not indulging in much wine and not pursuing dishonest gain. They must keep hold of the deep truths of the faith with a clear conscience." In G-6.0401 of The Presbyterian Church USA Book of Order "The office of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of sympathy, witness, and service after the example of Jesus Christ. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, of exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, warm sympathies, and sound judgment should be chosen for this office."



What did the first seven deacons do? They distributed food to the widows daily, took care of the need of the early church members and proclaimed the gospel.

What are the responsibilities of deacons today? In G-6.0402 of the Book of Order "It is the duty of deacons, first of all, to minister to those who are in need, to the sick, to the friendless, and to any who may be in distress both within and beyond the community of faith. They shall assume such other duties as may be delegated to them from time to time by the session, such as leading the people in worship through prayers if intercession, reading the Scriptures, presenting the gifts of the people, and assisting with the Lord's Supper."

What are some of the responsibilities of deacons at MagPres? They contact church members in their flocks; find people to be greeters at each church service; help with bereavement of members; call on members in the hospital; prepare elements and assist with communion; send cards to members in distress; collect canned food for Lutheran Social Services; write a monthly UpLook article; put together Giving Baskets; keep the electronic pray chain up dated; coordinate the church's part of the Care Portal program; contact their special friends; prepare food boxes at Christmas time.

- -the influx of new visitors, a number of whom are now members
- -the start of a new fellowship group called Prime-Time
- -substantial participation in growth groups
- -Pastor Claire going down the water slide :-p

On the other hand, there are things that might cause some to pause:

- -saying goodbye to staff who have transitioned away from MagPres
- -over 10 memorial services
- -"too much change too quickly"

So in the last year, we have had these excitement building, life giving experiences and we have had the opposite too. And the tension that these poles have created in proximity to each other has made it a little awkward. No, that's not the right word. The tension that these two opposites has created in proximity to each other...the result of this tension is energy, and in the wine making business, that is called fermentation.

Imagine if this fermentation process, this energy creating process happened a number of years ago, amidst conflict and people leaving MagPres. This process could have burst the fabric of this congregation. Imagine if this fermentation or energy creating process happened a few years ago during an interim and/or waiting period. This could have caused us to burst.

By the grace of God, we have created a new wineskin (structure) that can handle our current fermenting. Praise be to God that you had the foresight to transition to this Co-Pastor model. Praise be to God that you called Pastor Claire and Pastor Paul as shepherds of this congregation. Praise be to God that we have been put together for such a time as this.

One day, when people visit the winery called the Presbytery of Riverside, they will look for the best bottle available. The will look for the one labeled MagPres, vintage 2018.

Friends, let's work to make this the best tasting vintage yet.

The March 2018 Treasurer's report indicates \$92,819.04 in income and \$91,842.50 in expenses. The result is a current positive balance of \$976.54 for the month of March.

This is good news. Also, if we consider the \$3,491.25 of endowment interest and \$272.39 of deficit reduction funds



that were budgeted to meet expected shortfalls, our adjusted balance for March is \$4,740.18.
